Thank you for your patience and support during these first few weeks of the new school year as we literally weathered a storm or two. Your amazing children are to be commended for their positivity, independence, resilience and adaptability in becoming familiar with 'back to school' routines. The school certainly feels calm, settled and happy with confident, caring learners who are following in the footsteps of Jesus through our refreshed ABCs and 3Rs - ka pai tamariki!

We continue to pray for communities impacted by Cyclone Gabrielle. Next week, there is a special 'house colour' token colour' mufti-day where any generous cash donations will be directed to the Caring Catholic Foundation's Cyclone relief appeal.

Learning teams at St Mark's have specific names that relate to key learning stages and compliment our school's motto, 'Seek and you shall find' as well as 21 century learning language.

Rooms 4, 6 and 7 is the **Kitea** team (kitea is to discover)

Rooms 8, 10 and 11 is the **Torotoro** team (torotoro is **to develop**)

Rooms 1, 2 and 3 is the Whakatere team (whakatere is to navigate)

This term's inquiry focus is encapsulated by the Māori term, *KAITIAKI* (which loosely translates to the concepts of guardianship and stewardship). Learners will take time to consider concepts such as conservation, care for the environment and sustainability. We hope our school children will enjoy learning more about the wonderful world in which they live.

Thank you for taking the opportunity to meet our classroom teachers and learning teams last week. I hope you found these sessions informative. You will notice 1:1 school interviews are scheduled for the first week of Term 2. These interviews provide the opportunity for teachers to share and discuss your child's individual learning, achievement and progress.


TERM 1 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

We begin each school year by learning about the special MISSION charism of our school and learning about the ways we follow in the footsteps of Jesus through our ABCs and 3Rs. Charism is divine energy and a gift of the Holy Spirit. The founder of Mission Schools, Sister Euphrasie Barbier's dream was to bring faith, education and love to the poor and the marginalised. God is on a 'Mission' in each one of us! God's mission is not impossible - it requires us to use our heads, hands and hearts to do HIS work in sharing the Good News to those we meet.

In RE, our tamariki will learn more about the meaning of prayer, karakia, and its importance in our lives. Through daily meditation across the school there will be a conscious reflection on God.

Liturgical year learning is focused on the season of **Lent**. Lent is a time we prepare our hearts by praying, fasting and alms giving. Lent commences on Ash Wednesday and lasts for 40 days excluding Sundays. It is a time of preparation and an opportunity to grow a deeper relationship with God through reflection and prayer. Lent ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter.

Each year our school supports Caritas, an organisation that promotes justice, peace and supports social issues all over the world. Let the work of my hands lead others to you my God.


Let all that I am and all that I do today give glory and praise to you my $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$. Amen

PARKING SAFETY

We are very fortunate to be able to park so closely to the school and to have access to a large parking area. When entering the site, please remember to drive slowly (5 -10kms) and to be patient as others reverse into, and exit from, individual parking spots. Please also remember that the shared driveway with the retirement village is a one way system - no-one should be driving up this driveway at any time. During school drop-off and pick-up times, all traffic exiting the shared driveway, should turn left as this assists traffic flow and is much safer for everyone.
